A Community Challenge

1,400+

families experience homelessness in Greater Cincinnati each year

56% of families who call the regional hotline for help do not receive services

A high family poverty rate coupled with the shortage of affordable housing units has exacerbated the need for family shelter in Greater Cincinnati—and the demand is growing. Our community must do more to help families in need.







FAMILY HOUSING PARTNERSHIP

- We are a partnership of the four emergency shelters dedicated to homeless families in Hamilton County.
 - Bethany House Services
 - Interfaith Hospitality Network
 - The Salvation Army
 - YWCA





HISTORY

- Started in 2000 with the name Family Shelter Partnership Program (FSPP).
- Originally formed to administer a grant from Hamilton County for direct client services.
- Goal: improve the case management system across the family shelters to create efficiency and standardized care.
- Bethany House Services provided fiscal oversight and leadership of the program.





- The CoC grant (from HUD) is the largest and most consistent funding source for FHP.
- \$323,230 per year.
- Funds Case Manager salaries at partner agencies.
- Funding is competitive and based on our collective housing/income outcomes.
- Bethany House is the lead agency & grant applicant.



Collaboration

- The FHP is also a place for trying innovative approaches to addressing family homelessness (i.e. Rapid Re-Housing Demo Program).
- Level of collaboration dramatically increased 2015 when the FHP created Solutions for Family Homelessness, a community wide plan.
- It increased again with COVID-19

COVID-19

- Unparalleled Collaboration within FHP and Homelessness Sector
 - FHP started with calls 7 days a week in mid-March with GCHC and STEH which continue today.
 - Homelessness Service Providers shortly thereafter and continue today.
- How do you "stay at home" when you don't have a home?
- How do you maintain "social distancing" when you are living in very close quarters in a shelter with 40 other moms and kids sharing bedrooms, bathrooms and dining rooms?
- Home is the safest place during COVID-19 and our families don't have a home.
- What's Next? Cincinnati's lowest income families were already struggling to pay rent and make ends meet before the pandemic.
- We must use this opportunity while there is a spotlight on our city's most vulnerable population to improve housing, healthcare, childcare, education,

Who We Serve

Across all Bethany House programs and services, we serve approximately 800 families annually—including 1,600 children.



95%

of our families are led by a single mom

70%

of family members are children-most under age 6

100%

of our families live in extreme poverty

Our average family is a single mom, 29-30 years old, with 2-3 children

Our Programs Work



of families leaving shelter moved to positive housing 82%

of families who exited shelter have remained housed



of families who graduated from housing programs have not returned to homelessness



WHY are families homeless?

It only takes one single and sometimes uncontrollable event to tip a family into homelessness.

Our Shelters



Children Bear the Brunt of Homelessness

- Sick twice as often
- Hungry twice as often
- Change schools 3-4 times per year
- Twice as likely to repeat a grade
- Twice the rate of learning disabilities
- Score significantly lower in reading, spelling, and math
- By the time homeless children are eight years old, one in three has a major mental disorder.

Current Challenge: Decentralized & Aging Facilities

- 7 current facilities—5 shelters & 2 admin
- Shelters are at maximum capacity
- 3 shelters are less effective "apartment style"
- 3 buildings are 110+ years old
- Maintenance is very expensive
- Moving staff and supplies between shelters is timeconsuming and costly
- No "flex" space for peak times
- De-centralized model limits programming





Bethany's Future

Bethany House is building a new family shelter and comprehensive services center designed to help families and children experiencing homelessness achieve housing stability and long-term self-sufficiency.

- Communal-style, traumainformed design
- On-site services, counseling and healthcare
- 24/7 safety, security and support for all families
- Classrooms for adult education
- Children's indoor and outdoor play areas
- Flexible space for "overflow"



Immediate & Long-Term Impact



Serve More Families

- Reduce average length of stay for families in shelter
- Serve 100 additional families annually
- Provide "overflow" space to meet the need during peak times

Deepen Support Services

- Expand onsite service offerings for families: healthcare, employment services, literacy/tutoring for children and adults
- Improve access to programs and provide 24/7 safety, security and support
- Improve quality of shelter facilities

Create More Positive Outcomes

- Increase number of families reaching long-term stability
- Improve educational and longterm outcomes for children
- Reduce cycle of generational homelessness in our community
