Re: Passage of Ordinances 202101428 and 202101429 Agenda Items, by the Law and Public Safety Committee, City of Cincinnati

Renters will suffer due to the Hamilton County Municipal Court's interpretation of the recent Sixth Circuit Court of Appeals to rescind the CDC Moratorium on Evictions. The moratorium protects renters from being evicted during the pandemic, by allowing them to pay in full their back and current rent, using federal and state rental assistance funding made available to renters during the pandemic. MARCC supports reinstating the CDC Moratorium rules and urges this Public Safety Committee recommend city council adopt Ordinance 202101428.

Without the Moratorium on Evictions property owners do not have to accept back or current rent payments from renters in Hamilton County and by default the City of Cincinnati. A Pay to Stay policy, Ordinance 202101429, can operate during and after the pandemic. Under this policy property owners are obligated to accept back and current rent unless the renter has committed other serious violations of the rental agreement. Many cities across the country have adopted "pay to stay" policies. In Ohio, both the cities of Toledo and Dayton have passed reasonable "pay to stay" ordinances.

The MARCC CourtWatch project observed the Hamilton County Eviction Docket in May and June of 2020. Out of almost 500 observations approximately 95% of renters were evicted. Under a Pay to Stay policy for Cincinnati the property owner is obligated to accept back and current rent, rather than rejecting it and proceeding with nonrenewal of the lease agreement or eviction. If this policy had already been in place, most of those renters, observed in court would have been spared eviction.

MARCC urges this committee recommend to City Council reinstatement of the CDC Moratorium on Evictions ordinance (202101428) and the Pay to Stay ordinance (202101429). Let's abide by CDC rules, and stand with other Ohio cities, like Toledo and Dayton who have passed pay to stay policies. By passing both, renters at risk remain in their homes and property owners increase their chance of collecting the rent they need to cover their costs.
